

Roblox Safety Checklist

Complete these steps before your child plays Roblox. Check each box as you go.

■ Step 1: Account Setup

- Create your own parent Roblox account at [roblox.com](https://www.roblox.com)
- Use an email address your child does not have access to
- Link your parent account to your child's account (Settings > Parental Controls)
- Verify your identity using a credit card or government ID (\$0 charge)
- Set a strong, unique password on your parent account
- Enable 2-step verification on your parent account (Settings > Security)

Tip: Verifying your identity unlocks remote management — you can control everything from your own phone.

■ Step 2: Content & Age Settings

- Confirm your child's account type (Kids for 5-8, Select for 9-15)
- Set content maturity: Minimal (ages 5-8) or Mild (ages 9-12)
- Review and block any specific games that are inappropriate
- Disable or restrict in-experience purchases

■ Step 3: Chat & Friends

- Set chat to 'Friends Only' (under 13) or review communication settings
- For children under 10: Set chat to 'Off'
- Disable direct messages from non-friends
- Review and approve your child's current friends list
- Disable or restrict new friend requests from strangers

- Turn off voice chat (not available to under-16 accounts by default)

Tip: Roblox's 2026 update defaults under-13 accounts to no direct messages. Verify this is enabled.

■ Step 4: Screen Time & Spending

- Set a daily Roblox screen time limit (recommended: 1 hr weekdays / 2 hrs weekends)
- Set monthly Robux spending limit to \$0 (require your approval for purchases)
- Enable purchase notifications to your phone/email
- Remove saved payment methods from the child's device
- Set device-level backup controls (Apple Screen Time / Google Family Link / Xbox Family Safety)

■■ Step 5: Talk to Your Child

- Explained that online friends are still strangers
- Taught them to NEVER share: real name, address, school, phone number, or passwords
- Showed them how to use the block and report buttons in Roblox
- Told them to always come to you if anything feels weird or uncomfortable
- Confirmed they know free Robux websites are always scams
- Completed the RobloxParents.org safety quiz together

Tip: Kids who know they won't get in trouble are far more likely to report problems. Reassure them often.

■ Ongoing: Monthly Check-In

- Review top games played this week in Parental Controls
- Check friends list for any new, unknown contacts
- Review weekly activity report (Microsoft Family Safety / Google Family Link)
- Ask your child about their favorite games and who they play with
- Check for any new Roblox platform safety updates at robloxparents.org
